People with this type of aphasia may be depressed and frustrated, because of their awareness of their difficulties. Wernicke's Aphasia. If you have this kind of aphasia, you may speak in uninterrupted, long, sentences; the catch is, the words you use are usually unnecessary or at times made-up.
